# Helping Families Achieve Better Nutrition, Despite Climate Shocks



## Your support at a glance



87 million capsules of vitamin A distributed to children under 5 to build immunity.



53,000 households trained in climate-smart agriculture practices.

Extreme weather is undermining every system families rely on to nourish mothers and children and exacerbating inequalities. Food and health systems are not strong enough in the countries in

which Helen Keller works to address increasing rates of malnutrition, putting more children and families at risk. As Helen Keller Chief Program Officer Shawn Baker so poignantly reflected, “At the end of the day, it is children, who have contributed nothing to climate change, who bear the brunt.”

Helen Keller partners with communities in Africa and Asia to mitigate the greatest impacts of climate change on nutrition: rising food costs, difficulty growing foods, and access to essential vitamins and nutrients. We partner with farmers and community leaders to teach women sustainable, climate-smart farming techniques. Planting flood- and drought-resistant seeds, growing in raised beds and tower gardens, and harvesting rainwater for use during the dry season all help these women and their families build resilience against the disruptions in food supplies caused by an increasing number of extreme, unpredictable weather events. These methods help put nutrient-dense foods on their tables and create an income source to make rising food and other costs more manageable. We also expand access to vitamins and supplements that protect health, especially for pregnant women and young children.

# Helping Displaced Nigerian Women Improve Food Security and Livelihoods

Rebecca Clement has been cultivating nutritious fruits and vegetables since she was a child. She was raised in a family of farmers in Garta, Nigeria, a small village in Adamawa state near the border of Cameroon. Now 58 and a mother of eight, she looked for ways to share her knowledge with others. Rebecca eagerly volunteered with Helen Keller to support women and teenage girls in Daware, a nearby community now home to families displaced by the country's ongoing conflicts.

Nearly 2.3 million displaced people currently live in northeast Nigeria's Adamawa state. Ongoing violence combined with climate crises and continued increases in food prices make these displaced families especially vulnerable to malnutrition. They struggle to find affordable foods, especially nutritious foods, which are critical to their family's health and survival. Rebecca was moved by the challenges these women were facing and wanted to help. "I felt compassion for them," she said.

Helen Keller is working with five communities hosting displaced people, including Daware, to improve nutrition and food security for women and children by providing nutrition education, child malnutrition screenings, and training and resources for starting home gardens. Model farmers like Rebecca teach women in the community about homestead agriculture and ways to cultivate nutritious crops, including leafy greens and vegetables rich in vitamin A. She also provides ongoing support by visiting each woman at home. Rotating crops throughout the year and growing a diversity of vegetables help the women improve their families' food security and nutrition.

Rebecca has trained 71 women. “As the months progressed, I witnessed the immediate impact of cultivating and consuming nutritious crops and how their lives and nutrition improved over time.”

# Vitamin A: Mightier Than Expected

When Helen Keller Intl – then the American Foundation for the Overseas Blind – enlisted Dr. Al Sommer, now Professor and Dean Emeritus of the Johns Hopkins Bloomberg School of Public Health, to study the impact of vitamin A deficiency on children more than 50 years ago, there was already much speculation that vitamin A deficiency was a leading cause of childhood blindness. The study aimed to answer several questions: why did children develop vitamin A deficiencies, what was the connection with vision, and how could we better protect children’s vision? During his research, Al made a remarkable discovery: giving children vitamin A could not only prevent blindness, but it also reduced child mortality by nearly a third.

This discovery – along with research and studies that have since followed – has shaped Helen Keller’s work ever since. Today, Helen Keller delivers vitamin A – a little more than \$1 a dose – to millions of children under the age of five across Africa and Asia, where deficiencies are most widespread. Beyond supplementation, we help families cultivate vitamin A-rich foods, like orange-fleshed sweet potatoes, and improve their livelihoods by selling surplus produce. Moreover, thousands of donors have stepped forward to help, enabling us to provide more vitamin A than we would have imagined.

# Community Health Heroes Dispel Misinformation in Côte d'Ivoire

Kady Doumbia remembers a time when families would regularly refuse vitamin A when she went out to distribute it to young children. A community health worker in the mountainous town of Man in Western Côte d'Ivoire, she cites a variety of concerns – refusal by husbands, lack of knowledge, and distrust – as the reasons behind the rejection.

Thankfully, times have changed. Kady stayed the course and has, over time, built trust by hosting education campaigns that have put parents and caregivers at ease. Today when Kady reaches a neighbor's door, she is immediately welcomed by men and women alike as she shares her message in Dioula, a local language, "Starting tomorrow, health workers will be coming into your homes to give vitamin A to the children. Don't chase them away... It's vitamin A, it's good for children."

Community health workers like Kady play a vital role in reducing vitamin A deficiencies, helping to reach all children between 6 and 59 months in the country's 113 health districts through trust-building, education, door-to-door campaigns, and helping health facilities deliver vitamin A when children come for their immunizations.

# Helping Children and Adults See Their Potential



## Your support at a glance



24 million people supported with essential vision care to ensure clear vision and prevent blindness.



129,000 children and adults in the United States received vision screenings and, for those who need them, prescription eyeglasses.



3,900 individuals screened for cataracts, of whom 751 received surgery for at least one eye.

A staggering 90 percent of vision loss is preventable or treatable. Yet, more than one billion people worldwide are living with vision loss because of barriers to accessing care. The spillover effects can be devastating, impacting their ability to learn, form friendships, earn an income, and stay safe.



Helen Keller partners with communities and local health networks to improve their ability to provide eye health services for children and adults. We provide vision screenings and no-cost prescription glasses, prevent and treat diseases like river blindness and trachoma, distribute critical nutrients like vitamin A, and deliver cataract surgery and other timely care for vision disorders.

# Cataract Treatment Provides Renewed Independence in Tanzania

Modesta's day-to-day life in the Mbarali District of Tanzania was becoming increasingly difficult as her eyesight worsened to the point that she couldn't count her own fingers. The 67-year-old feared she would be dependent on her children for the rest of her life. Her spirits lifted when she received a visit from a Helen Keller Intl-trained community health worker who was conducting door-to-door cataract screenings in her village.

Cataracts are one of the most common causes of blindness worldwide. While they can typically be treated surgically, access and expense can be a barrier. In addition, women suffer disproportionately – even though 60 percent of people with cataracts are women, men are 1.39 times more likely to receive surgery. Helen Keller has been working with communities and partners in Tanzania to overcome these obstacles to care, a cost-effective treatment that costs only \$185.

Modesta's cataract surgery was life-changing. The day after, she already noticed a significant improvement in her vision. Eventually, Modesta was able to return to her daily tasks.

"The surgery was a miracle for me," she said, adding, "I was disappointed, believing I could not see again, and stopped going to the farm and doing household activities, but now I enjoy doing all the things I love."



# Preventing Vision Loss from Diabetic Retinopathy in Bangladesh



Nasima Khatun's vision had been deteriorating for years. Then one morning, the vision in her right eye suddenly became obscured by what looked like a red cloud. A homemaker in a family of farmers, the 41-year-old mother of two grown children had been living with type 2 diabetes for more than a decade. Doctors at the Pabna Diabetic Hospital diagnosed her with diabetic retinopathy, which occurs when uncontrolled blood sugar levels damage the retina's blood vessels.

Since 2009, Helen Keller has been at the forefront of improving access to treatment and prevention of diabetes-related vision loss in Bangladesh. We partner with healthcare facilities that provide diabetes services to improve awareness of diabetic retinopathy and increase early detection and treatment. We train healthcare workers, provide equipment, and conduct community education.

Helen Keller helped refer Nasima for treatment to shrink the damaged blood vessels and prevent additional damage. While the treatments couldn't fully restore her vision, Nasima could see much more clearly after receiving care.



“You people are doing good work here. Keep on helping people like us,” Nasima said, adding, “Thank you for identifying the problem, otherwise I could be blind.”

## New Glasses Bring a New School Year into Focus

When Kamden lost his glasses, his family couldn't afford another pair. His teacher tried to help by moving the nine-year-old to the front of the room and writing larger on the board, but he still struggled.

Impaired vision can prevent children from fully engaging in school and with their peers, launching a ripple effect of negative outcomes that can affect their education, income, and ability to support their families.

Helen Keller partners with schools and community organizations to provide no-cost vision screenings and prescription glasses to children and adults in California, Minnesota, New Jersey, and New York where disparities in healthcare take a toll. "When we first started out, we mainly targeted children," said Jorge Valdez, Program Manager in California. "But now we're providing vision care to families as a whole."

Kamden, his sister Amaya, and their mother, Brittany, all had their vision screened and received corrective glasses during an event hosted by Young and Healthy Pasadena, one of Helen Keller's partners in California. With his new pair of green-framed eyeglasses, Kamden is excited to enter the fourth grade. "I think it's going to be great," he said.

# Community Health Heroes Build Healthier Communities

Community health heroes are pillars of healthcare systems across Africa and Asia. These dedicated individuals work within their own communities to bridge gaps in services by educating families and communities and delivering direct services. They reach families who might otherwise be left out of essential care, and they transform whole communities through education about infectious diseases, nutrition, hygiene, and maternal health.

Helen Keller partners with governments and communities to train and support community health heroes in providing essential medications, care, and education. These everyday heroes support access to drugs that prevent and treat debilitating neglected tropical diseases, offer screenings and treatment referrals for child malnutrition, identify cases of diseases that threaten vision, and work with mothers and families to support good nutrition for women and children. They are building healthier, more resilient communities and a brighter future for all.

# Eliminating Debilitating Diseases: A Shared Goal Across Countries



Community health heroes Aminata Sama and Noel Kambou live in different countries, speak different languages, and have never met. But they are contributing to the same goal: eliminating debilitating neglected tropical diseases that threaten the health of their communities.

In partnership with the governments of Burkina Faso and Sierra Leone, Helen Keller is supporting community health heroes like Aminata and Noel with training and resources to curb the spread of diseases through mass drug treatment.

As a nurse in Sierra Leone's Kenema District, Aminata is deeply aware of the impact of schistosomiasis, a parasitic disease that spreads through contaminated water and poses serious long-term health risks for children. She is part of a nationwide team of 30,000 community health heroes who go from school to school to administer the anti-parasitic medication praziquantel to children between the ages of six and eleven.

In Burkina Faso, Noel has first-hand experience with the devastating impacts of these diseases, having lived with one for more than half of his life. Spread by mosquitoes, lymphatic filariasis can cause severe swelling of limbs, which has caused Noel serious pain and made it difficult for him to work.

With a small team of local community health heroes, Noel helps prevent others from contracting this disease by raising awareness and going door-to-door to distribute medication to everyone eligible. He remembers a time when many people in the community were suffering from lymphatic filariasis but says, thanks to the preventive medication, “now things are looking up.”

# Women-led Peer Support Groups Improve Health in Nepal

In the heart of rural Bareng, Nepal, women assembled at the Gadel Health Unit for a meeting of their mothers group, led by Bishnu Kumari Thapa, a community health hero who volunteers her time to do this transformative work.

Not long before, remote communities like Bareng struggled with fragmented knowledge about the health and nutrition of mothers and children and lacked opportunities to discuss these crucial topics. Women community health heroes faced their share of challenges, from limited nutrition counseling skills to difficulties in obtaining materials to guide group sessions.

Through Helen Keller's Suaahara II project, we supported 27,000 community health volunteers like Bishnu. The volunteers shared what they learned with new mothers and their families by providing health and nutrition counseling, supporting breastfeeding, demonstrating how to cook nutritious meals with locally sourced ingredients, and leading peer support groups.

As a group leader, Bishnu has helped build bonds among the women of her community while providing vital education to support the health and nutrition of women and children.

# Engaging Local Leaders for Better Health and Nutrition



Engaging governments and community leaders is key to creating sustainable health and nutrition systems. Helen Keller builds deep partnerships within communities to understand their challenges and co-create solutions that address barriers to good health, sound nutrition, and clear vision.



One of those local leaders, Rose Fanged, has helped build support for nutrition and health services in her community in Cameroon's Far North Region. The Third Deputy Mayor of Koza could see that many children in her community, including her nephew and godson, Wouffé, were underweight and likely weren't getting the nutrition they needed to grow and thrive. When an opportunity arose to collaborate with Helen Keller and UNICEF to improve health and nutrition among children, teen girls, and women, she and other members of the Local Council eagerly agreed.

Rose helped identify challenges, including a lack of knowledge about and access to nutritious complementary foods for children who are still breastfeeding. Women in the community learned how to make a nutrient-rich porridge from easily available and affordable local ingredients, which Rose says helped her now 10-month-old nephew recover from malnutrition. The porridge has become so popular that some women are now making and selling it to earn an income.

The successes of this partnership have encouraged local governments to continue investing in nutrition services to fight malnutrition and support the health of their communities into the future. Rose says the Koza government believes it has a duty to continue these nutrition initiatives and is one of five local councils that now allocates at least one percent of its budget to improving nutrition in the community. According to Rose, women who have been trained through our partnership will in turn, "train other women until they all have learned preventive measures against malnutrition and hunger."

# Research Helps Expand Access to Prenatal Vitamins

To help children get the best start in life, we need first to ensure that their mothers are well-nourished. Yet two-thirds of women globally are deficient in at least one essential micronutrient, such as iron, zinc, or vitamin A. This can lead to negative health outcomes for both mom and baby.

Helen Keller is working with governments to expand access to multiple micronutrient supplements that contain 15 essential vitamins and minerals. These prenatal vitamins would replace the older iron-folic acid supplements that have helped improve pregnancy outcomes but don't provide a complete regimen of nutrients.

In Cambodia, Helen Keller, Vitamin Angels, and the Ministry of Health have collaborated to conduct studies on prenatal vitamins and their acceptance among pregnant women. Participants in a pilot study comparing prenatal vitamins to the simpler version of iron-folic acid supplements preferred the more holistic prenatal vitamins. Women reported fewer negative side effects, such as nausea. Horm Taing Yu, a participant in the pilot study shared, "After taking the [prenatal vitamins], I had restful sleep, was able to eat a diverse range of foods, did not experience morning sickness, and felt good."



A more recent study led by Helen Keller examined factors that might support or enable pregnant women to accept these new prenatal vitamins. This study is essential to helping government and communities understand and address barriers, expand access, and improve community education, advancing overall health and nutrition for pregnant women.

“Prenatal vitamins offer a simple, cost-effective solution to improve the health of pregnant women and give babies a robust start in life,” said Hou Kroeun, Cambodia Country Director. “They provide more complete nutrition than iron-folic acid supplements with fewer negative side effects. Scaling up multiple micronutrient supplementation will help ensure mothers have the nutritional support they need so that moms and their babies can thrive.”

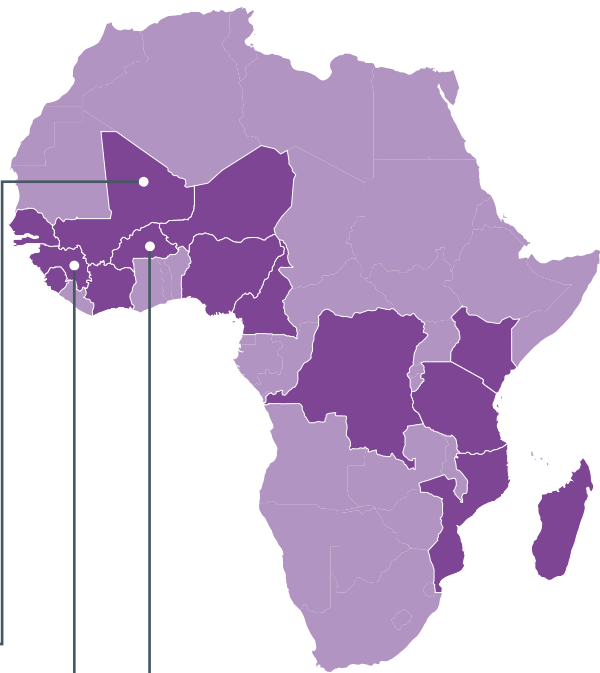

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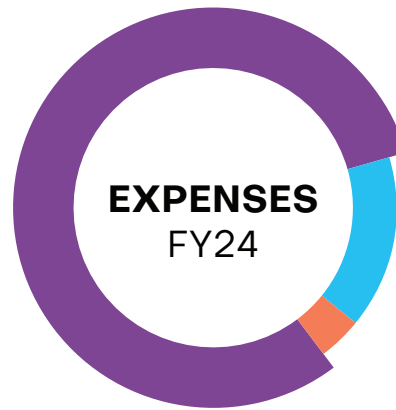
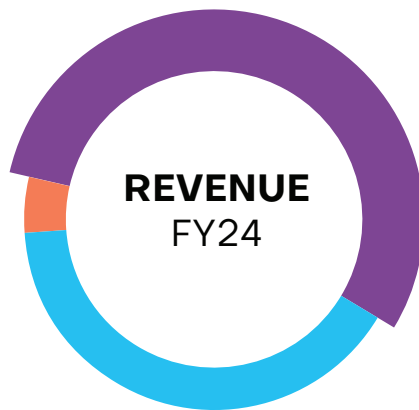

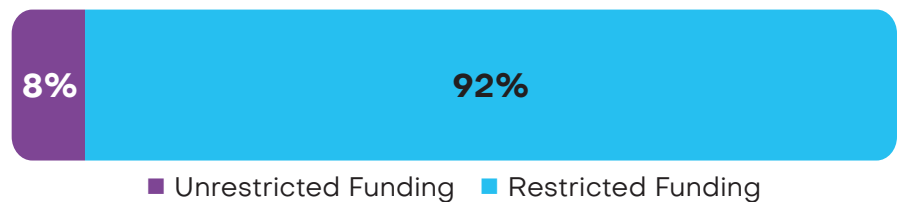

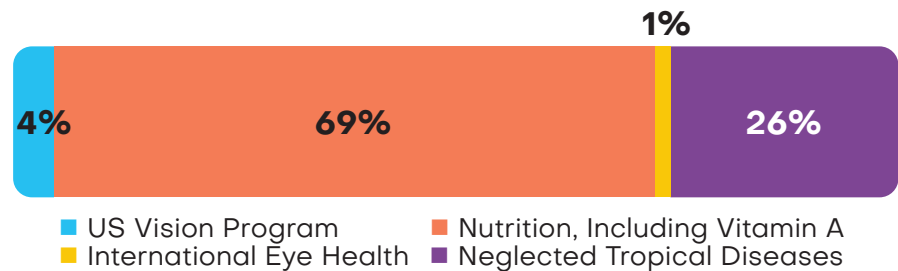
